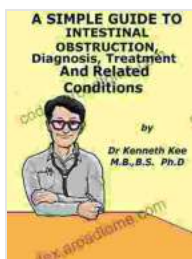

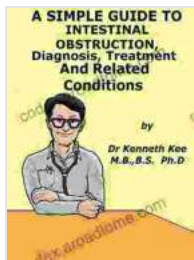
Related Conditions
