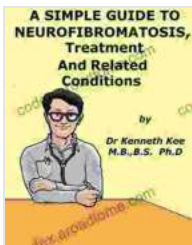


Simple Guide to Neurofibromatosis Treatment and Related Diseases

* **NF1** is the most common type. It affects about 1 in every 3,000 people. Symptoms can vary widely, but they may include café-au-lait spots (light brown patches on the skin), freckles, learning disabilities, and skeletal abnormalities. * **NF2** is less common than NF1. It affects about 1 in every 25,000 people. Symptoms typically include hearing loss, tinnitus (ringing in

the ears), and balance problems. * **Schwannomatosis** is a rare type of NF that affects about 1 in every 40,000 people. It is characterized by the growth of schwannomas, which are tumors that develop on the nerves.

Causes of Neurofibromatosis

NF is caused by mutations in genes that are involved in the growth and development of the nervous system. These mutations can be inherited from a parent or they can occur spontaneously.

Symptoms of Neurofibromatosis

The symptoms of NF can vary depending on the type of disorder and the individual. Some of the most common symptoms include:

* Café-au-lait spots * Freckles * Learning disabilities * Skeletal abnormalities * Hearing loss * Tinnitus * Balance problems

Diagnosis of Neurofibromatosis

Living with NF can be challenging, but there are a number of resources available to help people with NF and their families. These resources include:

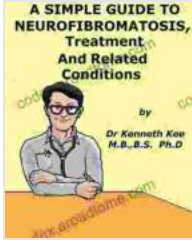
