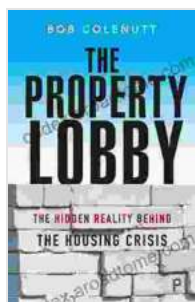

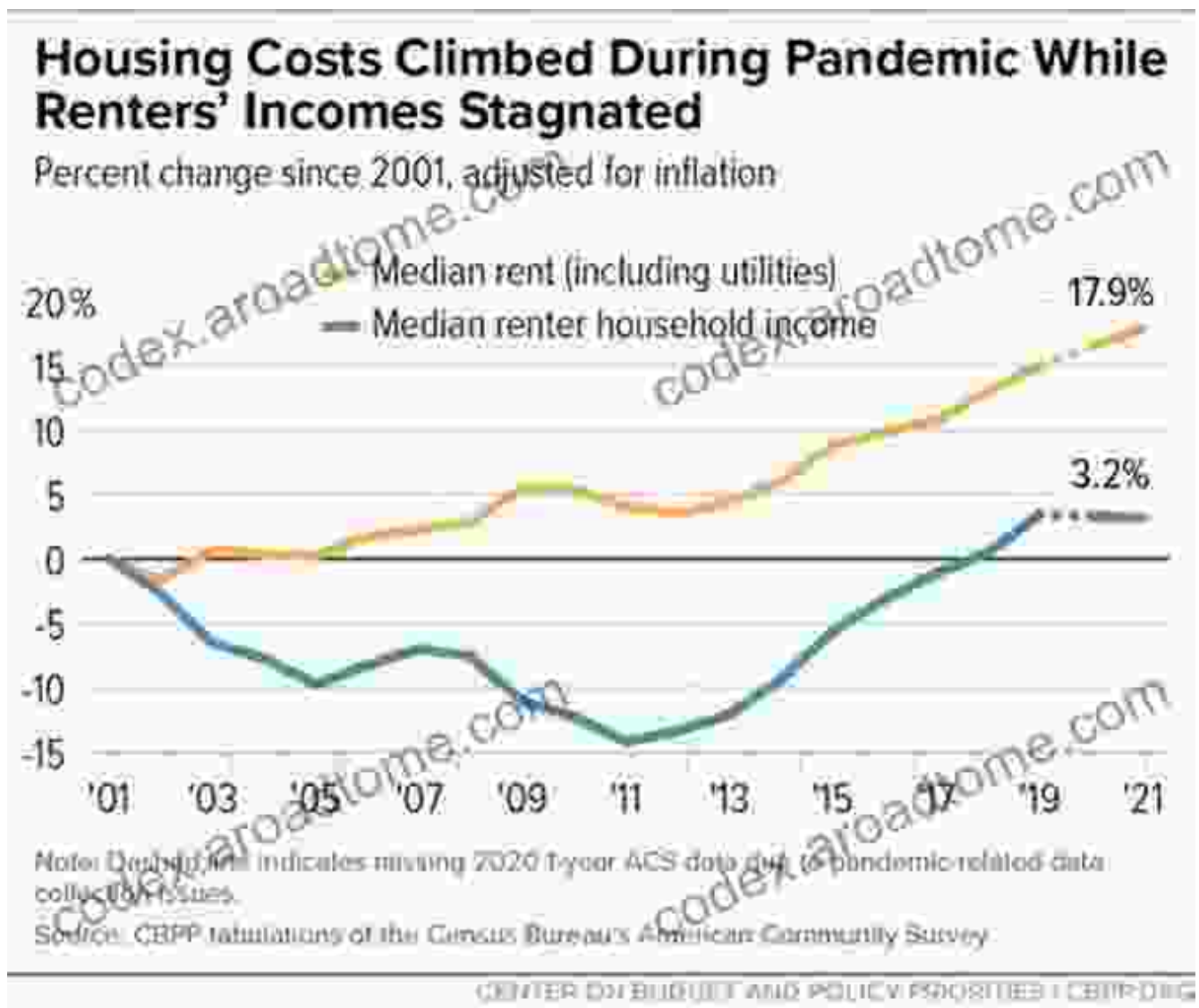

3. Regulatory Failures and Weak Tenant Protections

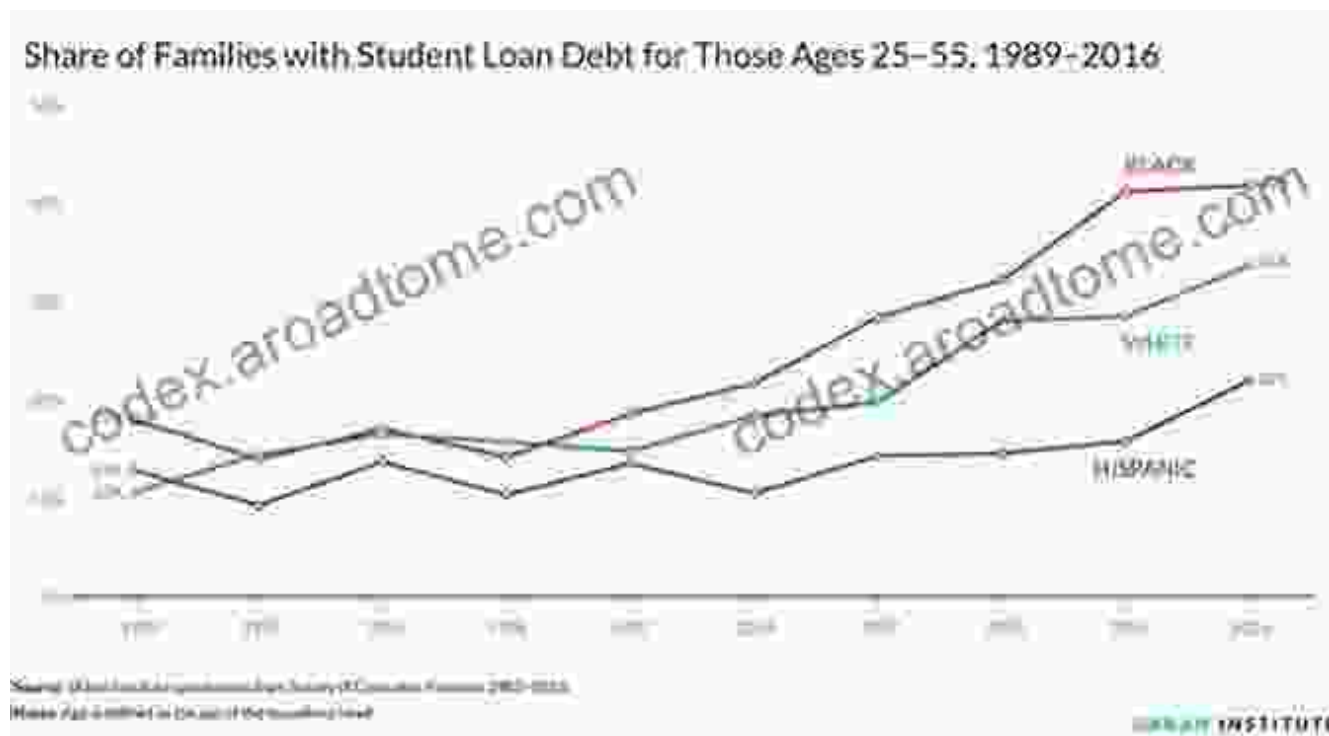

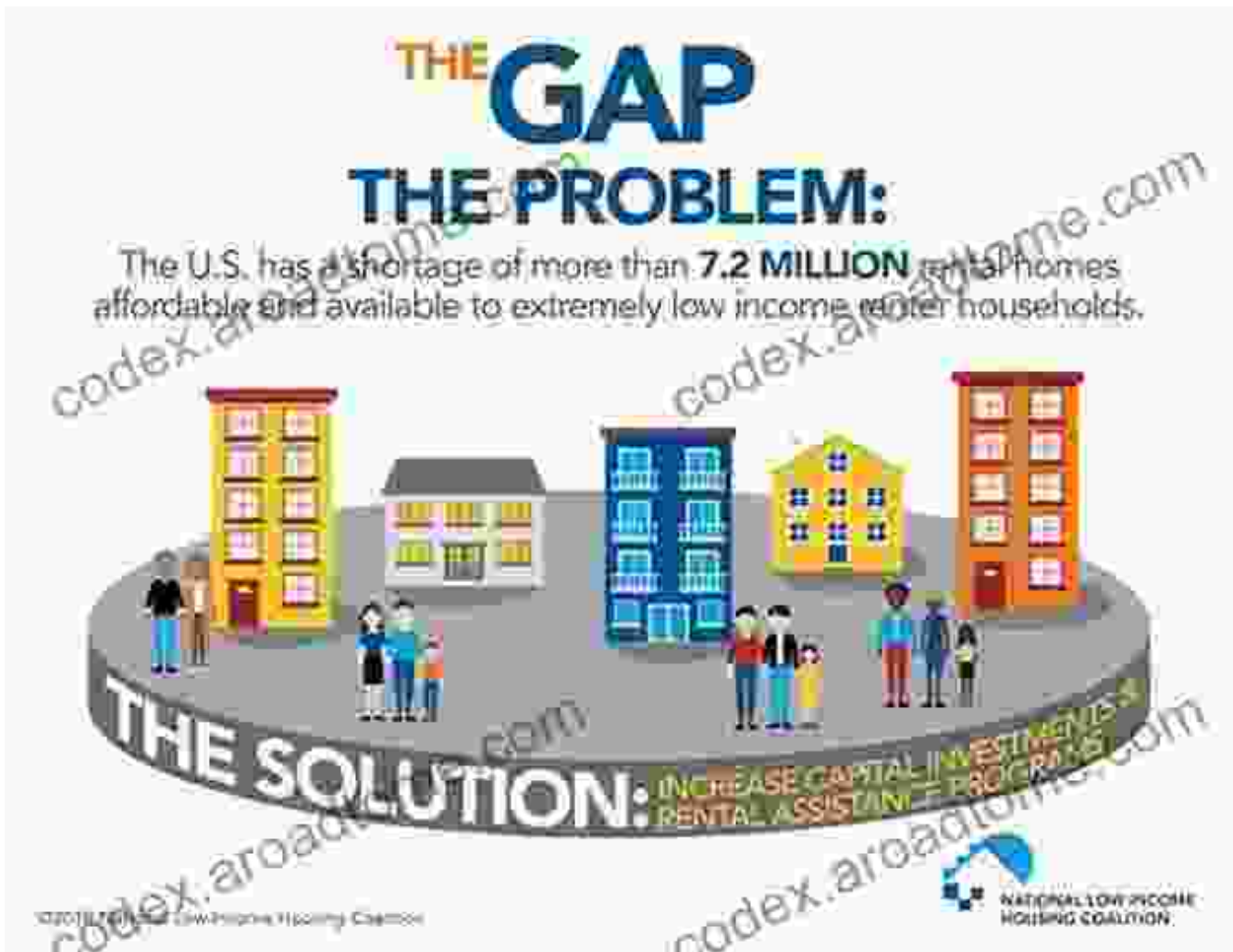

1. Homelessness and Housing Instability

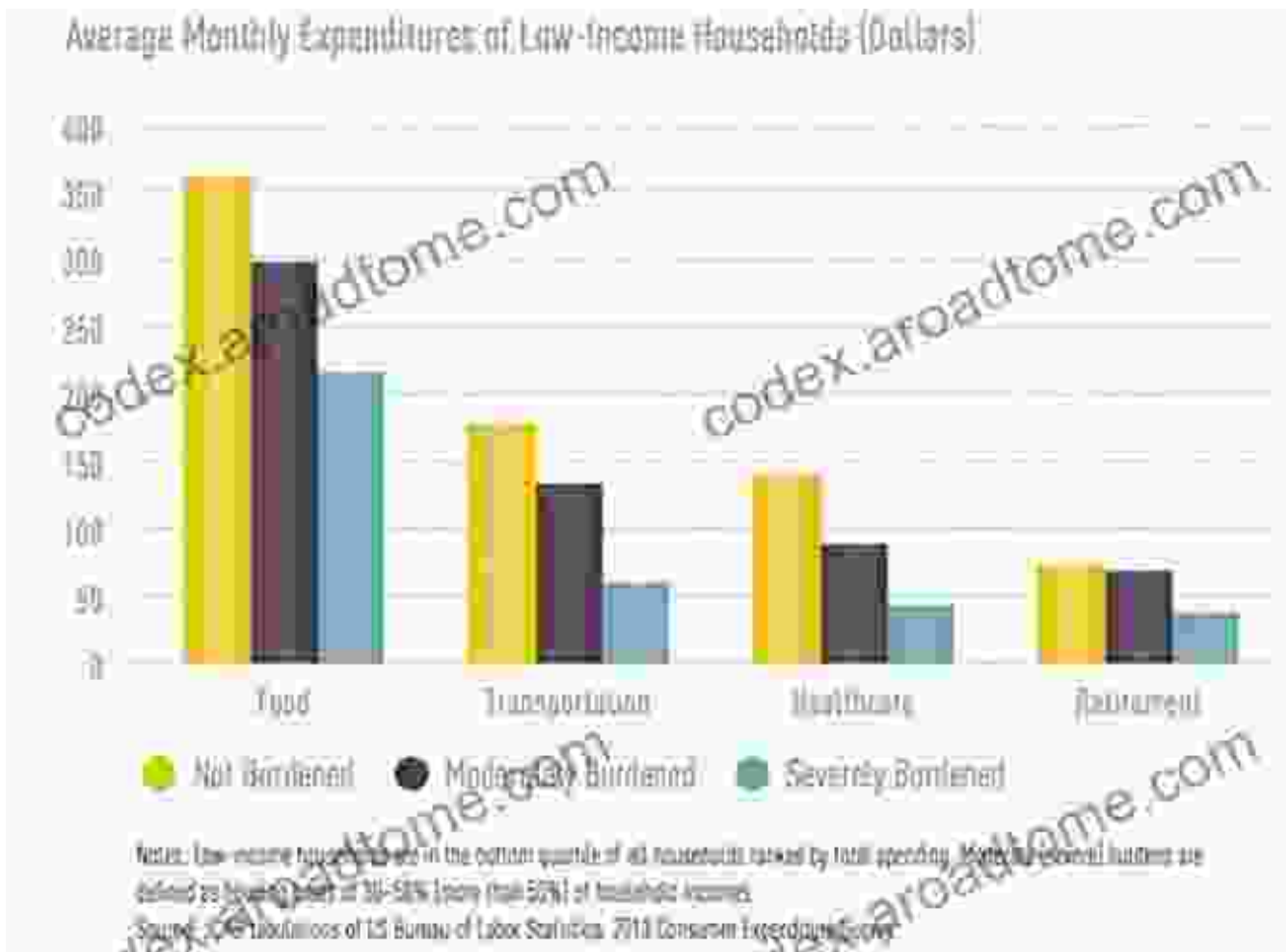

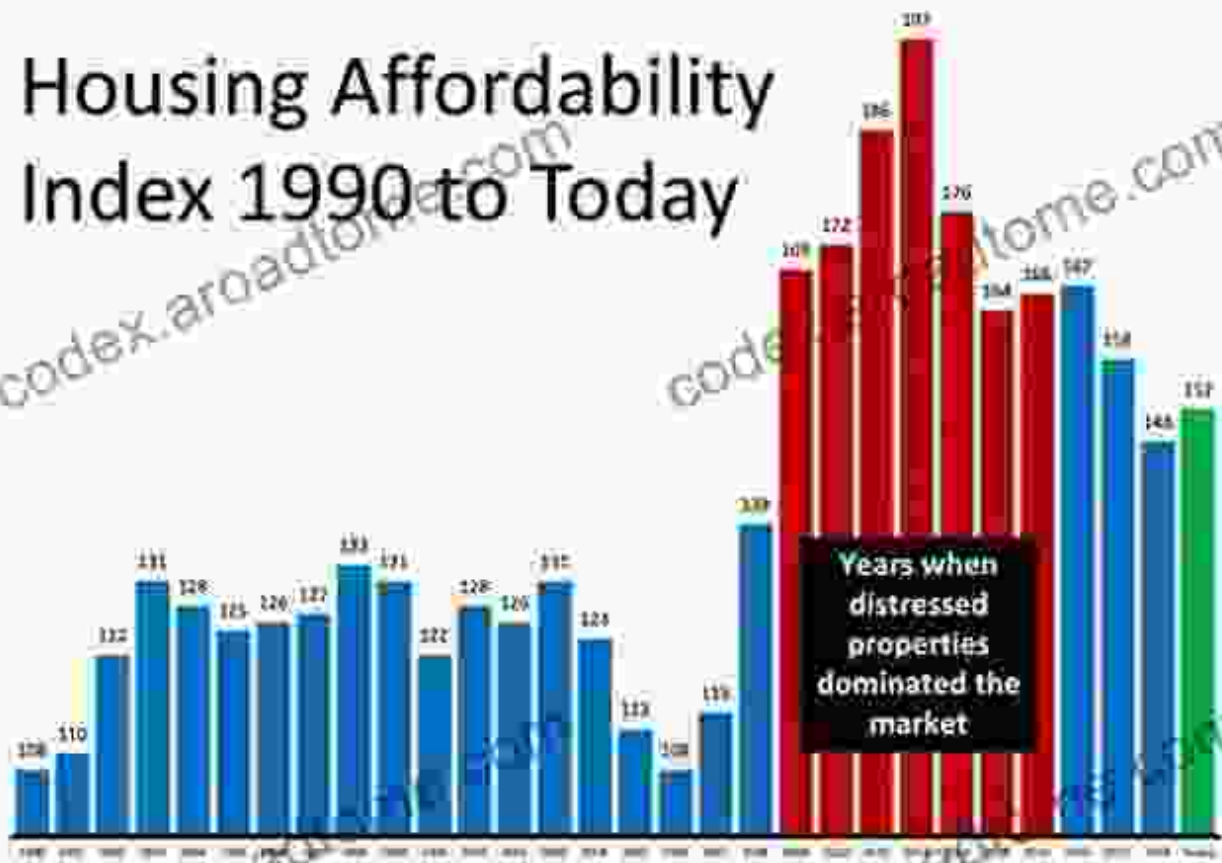
